












Salutation and Collect of the Day

Epistle Romans 3:19–28

¹⁹Now we know that whatever the law says it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be stopped, and the whole world may be held accountable to God. ²⁰For by works of the law no human being will be justified in his sight, since through the law comes knowledge of sin.

²¹But now the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law, although the Law and the Prophets bear witness to it—²²the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction: ²³for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, ²⁴and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, ²⁵whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith. This was to show God's righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over former sins. ²⁶It was to show his righteousness at the present time, so that he might be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus.

²⁷Then what becomes of our boasting? It is excluded. By what kind of law? By a law of works? No, but by the law of faith. ²⁸For we hold that one is justified by faith apart from works of the law.

P The Holy Gospel according to St. John, the eighth chapter.









Lord's Prayer






The Words of Our Lord



Stewardship Emphasis 2024

On this Reformation Sunday we give thanks to God for his preservation of the pure teaching of the Gospel through the ages. This also marks the conclusion of our examination of the Sunday readings in light of our calling as stewards in God's kingdom. May the Lord continue to strengthen our service in his kingdom as we steward all the gifts that he has given us.

Monday—John 8:31–36

What does it mean to be a disciple of Jesus? Do we seek opportunities to sit at the feet of his Word so that we might grow daily in the faith? Are there ways you might like to manage your time better in the coming year in order to be refreshed through your study of the Scriptures? In what ways will this set you free?

Tuesday—Romans 3:19–28

Though we may not always feel it to be true, God has given us the Law for our good. In what ways does it prevent us from deceiving ourselves (v. 20)? How is it freeing to hear that our standing before God is not dependent on anything we bring to God but instead upon Christ's work for us?

Wednesday—Matthew 11:12–19

This is an optional Gospel reading for Reformation Day. In many ways it's a hard saying. What does it mean that the kingdom of God has suffered violence? Why do Satan and all his followers rage so furiously against Jesus and his church? Are we prepared to suffer all, even earthly gain and honorable reputation, for the sake of confessing Jesus to those who do not know him?

Thursday—John 8:31–36

Returning to this reading one more time, what the freedom that Jesus speaks of entail? If we are truly set free from our old nature, what will our lives look like? Read 2 Cor. 9:9–13. Note how St. Paul links God's generosity toward us with an expectation of generosity toward others. What does that look like in your life? Are you willing to give of your time or talent or treasures for others? Even when it's inconvenient?

Friday—Philippians 1:3–11

What does St. Paul mean by "partnership in the Gospel?" In what way are we, as members of this congregation, partners? Are we open to giving of our time for the sake of that partnership? Are we open to serving our fellow Christians in ways that may require that we sacrifice our time for the good of the whole congregation? Or our treasures? When we doubt that we have it in us to do so, what does Paul say by way of encouragement (v. 6).

Saturday—Matthew 5:1–12

This is the Gospel for tomorrow as we celebrate All Saints' Day. As we read through these Beatitudes, do you find it difficult to see yourself in Jesus' descriptions? Are we completely poor in spirit in the way that Jesus expects? Or pure in heart? Now ask instead whether all of these statements are perhaps fulfilled most truly in Jesus himself. How has he been

poor in spirit for you? And a peacemaker? Even when tribulations come, where is our hope (vv. 10–12)?

Prayer

Read the Collect of the Day on the reverse side every day! Then conclude with this prayer:

Almighty God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, in Your mercy You have caused the light of the Gospel to shine brightly through Your holy church. Bless, strengthen, and uphold our pastors as they carry out their calling to hold Jesus before our eyes. Give them faithfulness in their proclamation, patience in times of testing, and joy in their service, that by their guidance this congregation may grow in steadfastness of purpose; through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

A prayer at the conclusion of our 2024 stewardship emphasis. Merciful God, You have blessed me in ways that I often fail to recognize. Continue to create in me a clean heart, and renew a right spirit within me. Forgive me for moments of selfishness, and teach me to look beyond my own cares and worries to trust that You will bear me upon whatever the circumstances. By Your Holy Spirit, grant me joy for the sake of Your holy name. Amen.
